The manliest city: Charlotte, N.C

The manly lifestyle of the city includes manly retail stores, manly occupations and an overabundance of salty-snack sales, according to the ranking done for Mars Chocolate North America by Spering's Best Places.

The most haunted city: Savannah, Ga.



The Kehoe House, built in 1892 for iron magnate William Kehoe, his wife and 10 children, is one of Savannah's most famous haunted sites. Now a bed-and-breakfast inn, two of its 13 rooms are said to be haunted, perhaps by the ghosts of twin Kehoe children who supposedly died while playing in a fireplace on the second floor. The most walkable city: San Francisco



From Chinatown to Market Street to the Embarcadero and famous neighborhoods such as Haight-Ashbury, San Francisco scores high on walkability. Neighborhood centers, main streets, public spaces and transit also figure into the score from Walkscore.com

The top city for college grads: Atlanta

The top city for working mothers: Minneapolis



The ranking from ForbesWoman was based on women's earnings, unemployment rates, crime levels, school systems, health care and cost of living.

The most earth-friendly city: Portland, Ore.



Portland was noted by Relocate-America.com for its recycling program, integrated green spaces and bicycling options. It's also a leader in renewable energy usage and environmentally sensitive commuters.

The most stressful city: Detroit



The ranking from Portfolio.com was based on unemployment statistics, percentage of families living below the poverty level, percentage of possible sunshine during an average year and the number of robberies and murders per 100,000 residents.
